Collaboration to start the season



The Renaissance Singers joins the Manawatu Sinfonia in a celebration of two of the great works of the German choral and orchestral tradition. In anticipation of its fortieth anniversary in 2015, the Choir has planned a series of concerts reflecting the range of its repertoire. This collaboration with the Manawatu Sinfonia is designed as a vehicle for bringing together two of the Manawatu's cultural assets.

The concert contrasts the polarities of birth and death as depicted in works by two of the greatest German composers, Bach and Brahms. Both works represent commitment to a wider view of the world than the composers' cultures would have approved of. Despite Bach being a committed Lutheran he chose to use the Latin of the Catholic liturgy. On the other hand, Brahms broke new ground by eschewing the traditional Latin text for the Requiem in a statement which emphasized humanity.

The Bach *Magnificat* is Mary's song of joy from St Luke's Gospel where she responds to the praise of her cousin, Elizabeth, who is pregnant with the future John the Baptist.

A German Requiem Op. 45 by Johannes Brahms, is a large-scale work for chorus, orchestra, and a soprano and a baritone soloist, composed between 1865 and 1868. A theme of transition from anxiety to comfort recurs in almost all the following movements and a tone of sympathetic humanism persists through the work, and the music covers a great range of emotional expression. At its heart is the heavenly vision of "How lovely are thy Dwellings."


