

COLOUR IN THE MUSIC

The Manawatu Sinfonia welcomes back regular guest conductor, Peter van Drimmelen for its first subscription concert. Peter has chosen a delightful programme of popular works not often played in the Manawatu that are attractive to audience and players alike. A unifying feature of the programme is the way the different composers have explored orchestral sounds to create new colours or timbres in their music.

Ravel's Mother Goose Suite, originally written as a piano duet for two small girls and with its nursery inspirations, is immediately attractive. Ravel was a master of orchestration creating new sounds by having instruments play in unusual combinations or register. In places an oboe or bassoon, silent for most of the piece, quietly plays a long note with another instrument to create a dab of sound colour note placed with exactness that belies simplicity of the piece. And listen for the less often heard instruments, the grotesque but empathetic contra-bassoon solo in the Beauty and the Beast.

In the *Little Plain Jane, Empress of the Pagodas* we hear Javanese musical motifs based on a pentatonic scale and duplicates the sound of the gamelan (an orchestra of percussion instruments) by using the harp, celesta, and xylophone.

But this is music that also goes deeper—the final movement is surely less about a Fairy Garden that **the movement title suggests than the composer's** wistful reflection on the innocence of childhood lost?

Mozart's Overture to his opera, Marriage of Figaro, is always popular. The business of the music suggests both Figaro's efforts to forestall his Count's intentions on his new wife and the comic aspects of this story. Mozart's Symphony 31 (Paris) is perhaps less well known that his later symphonies. It is an experimental work, as Mozart explored the possibilities of the orchestral wind section available to him in Paris. The use of wind and brass used here are now part of the standard orchestra. But at the time, this **symphony was a novel experience for Mozart's** audience as he explored the new sounds available to him.

The highlight of the concert must however be the Bottesini contrabass concerto to be performed by NZSO principal bass player, Hiroshi Ikematsu. Sinfonia members were impressed with the **Hiroshi's effortless performance in rehearsal**. Notable was the rich but clear sound he achieves **on his bass, 'like a cello, only richer sounding' as** one described it.

As well the Sinfonia is to perform the overture to **Reznicek's opera, 'Donna Diana'**. This is true orchestral show-piece with brilliant writing, demonstrating verve and an exciting pace that never lets up.

VIRTUOSO BASS SOLOIST

The Sinofnia's first concert features Brazilianborn Japanese Contrabassist Hiroshi Ikematsu. Currently Principal Contrabass with the NZSO, he is uniquely talented and regarded as one of the leading contrabassists in Japan.

Ikematsu started to play the contrabass at the age of 19 and in 1989, he joined the NHK Symphony Orchestra in Tokyo, and was appointed as the Principal Contrabassist in 1994.

Ikematsu has performed not only as a soloist, but leads a string ensemble **"Vega"** as well as a contrabass ensemble he founded.

In addition to the chamber music activities involved at "*Kioi Symfonietta*" and "*Tokyo Ensemble*", Ikematsu was also the core member in a group called "*Pleiade Quintet*", which has been well known for its performance of contemporary music and released an album with BMG.

Since his first solo recital in Casals Hall in 1999, Ikematsu has established a strong name as a great solo contrabassist in Japan. He has played with numerous distinguished musicians, and successfully released 4 solo CDs nationwide.

Ikematsu immigrated to New Zealand with his family, joining the NZSO officially as the Principal Contrabassist in April 2006. As well as an enthusiastic trout fisher, camper and soccer goer, Ikematsu also enjoys spending time with his two kids, making New Zealand one of his dream countries.


